




Though she has been a Hollywood hit since age 16, Alicia Silverstone remains surprisingly

Her eating habits weren't exemplary either. "Steak and doughnuts," recalls Silverstone, who also used to smoke. "I wasn't very healthy." Then in 1998 she attended an animal-rights meeting and had a revelation while watching her vegan colleagues savor a meatless lunch. "I realized that I was the problem. I was an animal lover who was eating animals."

Silverstone drove home in tears and told Jarecki she wanted to stop eating meat, eggs and dairy, and stop using anything made of materials that come from animals, including wool or leather clothing. He signed on to the plan as well. "Now I'm a total health nut," she says. "I don't get sick very often, and when I do it lasts for a short period. It's empowering to know that you're responsible for how you feel each day because of the way you treat your body."


Silverstone is undeniably earnest, but she and Jarecki also know how to have fun. On one side of the house, the couple—who met outside a movie theater in 1997 (she said hi first; he asked her out)—have a trampoline they jump on regularly. "It's great exercise and really makes you giggle," the actress says. The two also enjoy entertaining by the pool, serving meals made with vegetables from their garden. "We have his bandmates


over a lot," Silverstone says of Jarecki's group, Little Wolverines. "We eat and drink wine and play water basketball. When the sun is shining, we're outdoors all the time." And for her, the closer to nature, the better. "It's just so lovely to appreciate the trees and birds and animals. the roof, energy-efficient appliances in the kitchen, and compact fluorescent lightbulbs in every socket—not to mention the Toyota Prius she has parked in the driveway. And with the recent installation of a well-engineered heating and cooling system, her place now draws half as much power from the grid as it used to. "I love living this way," she says. "It's so satisfying and inspiring."

"Alicia really cares about the health of

the planet," says Mary Cordaro, an environmental consultant who works with Silverstone to ensure that her choices are indeed eco-savvy. "She's passionate about making the right decisions."
